

Reflection

Pentecost Sunday

This Sunday we celebrate Pentecost Sunday. As we reflect on how the Holy Spirit empowered the disciples in their mission, we continue to pray for our Year 6 students who, like Jesus' disciples, will be strengthened by the Holy Spirit in Confirmation on June 28.

Please see the First Reading for this Sunday's Mass: Pentecost Sunday.

Acts 2:1-11 -They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak.

When Pentecost day came round, they had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Principal's Message

NEW BUILDING

The school is currently finalising plans for the construction of the new building which would be located adjacent to the current Year 6 classrooms on the first floor of the main school building. This project is funded by the school through a loan through the Catholic Development Fund (CDF). The increase in the Capital Levy this year is funding the project and the loan repayments into the future, with Architecture Matters engaged as the school architect. Architecture Matters were also responsible for developing the school Master Plan in 2023 after the School Advisory Council sub-committee met with a number of architectural firms to consider their services. As representatives of the parents community, the School Advisory Council have been involved in providing feedback on the design of the new classroom and the associated infrastructure requirements. The design includes a new staircase as well as a lift to allow access to the upper level

learning spaces. The design also includes an undercroft area so children can be protected from the weather on the wet mornings and parents can shelter from the rain when picking up. By having the building on the first floor the children lose minimal playground space. To ensure that the building did not look like an 'add on' the facade of the new construction would match the facade of the existing classrooms which were constructed in 2011. Below is an image of the new classroom design.

EXPLICIT DIRECT INSTRUCTION

With the school's move to Explicit Direct Instruction, one of the strategies the teachers have been focused on is ensuring the children are engaged in their learning and are exhibiting the learning behaviours. To support this engagement, teachers are continually reviewing their processes and ensuring the 'engagement norms' are being followed. These engagement norms include:

- **Pronounce with me:** This is where the teacher pronounces the more challenging words and the children repeat the pronunciation.
- **Track with me:** Children point to the words as the teacher reads them out aloud.
- **Read with me:** The children read with the teacher.
- Gesture with me: Gesturing is used to add a physical movement that conveys meaning which both the teachers and children do
- Attention Signal: A call to refocus the children's attention.
- **Pair Share:** The children use a designated partner to explain their answer to a question posed to them. This allows for the children to discuss and practise their answer before being called upon to share their response.
- Whiteboards: Children record their response to problems



SEMESTER 1 SCHOOL REPORTS: nForma APP

This semester you will receive your child's semester report via the new nForma Parent App. It is necessary for each family to follow the instructions to have access to your child's Semester 1 school report. Please see the Audiri app notification sent out on the 2nd June for further information.

We ask you to please download the nForma Parent App as soon as possible, so that you can contact us if there are any issues prior to Semester 1 reports becoming available on **Wednesday 2nd July.** An Audiri app notification will be sent to the school community once the reports are available for you to access and questions presented and is used by the teacher to check for the children's level of understanding of the work being presented.

These norms are used by teachers throughout the English and Mathematics lessons regularly and this allows for the high interaction between teacher and students to keep them engaged throughout the learning.

FAMILY SUPPORT GROUP

Earlier this week all families received a letter outlining the role of the Family Support Group. It also asked for volunteers to support the work of this group. We have had a number of families already indicate that they are able to help out should there be a need within our school community for this service. Thank you to those people who have responded and I would encourage others who are considering it to respond asap.

PHONES AND SMART WATCHES

A reminder that any children coming to school with phones or smart watches, need to hand the device to their classroom teacher at the beginning of the day and collect it from their teacher at the end of the day. It is the child's responsibility to ensure that they follow this process. The school discourages these devices and any items of value being brought to school.

encourage your child to use screens in healthy ways.

- 1. Make rules about screen time and digital technology use
- This includes where your child uses technology, when they use technology, how they use technology and how they stay safe online.
- 2. Aim for short screen time sessions.
- Use a timer and plan an activity when the screen time ends such as playing outside.

- 4. Imagine and create.
- Creative activities such as telling stories, dressing up or drawing are good for your child's development.

- When children play face to face with others, they develop important life skills.

- Screen time and technology use before bed can affect how quickly your child falls asleep and how well they sleep.
- 7. Keep digital technology out of bedrooms at night.
- This can stop your child being disturbed with notifications.

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SPS Speech Box

The importance of sounds for early reading development



Being able to recognise, name and write letters is important for children to know, however, when it comes to learning how to read there are some key skills that children need to be successful.

Reading English involves understanding that letters represent sounds. Children need to know what sound/s are represented by what letters, not just their names, so they can learn how to read new words. This skill is referred to as phonics.

Children learn to read by "Understanding that letters and letter clusters in written words represent the sounds in spoken words" (Buckingham, Wheldall & Wheldall, 2019). In other words, learning the alphabetic code - the links between sounds and letters - is key. Children also need to practice the skills of segmenting (breaking words into their sounds) and blending (joining sounds together to read a word) (Rose, 2006).

Maths Enrichment News

Our Maths Enrichment Program is designed to target high achieving students in Mathematics, focussing on problem solving and working collaboratively in groups to solve challenging Maths equations. Congratulations to all students from Year 3/4 who have participated in the Maths Games competition and those from Year 5/6 participating in the Maths Olympiad competition this semester. The Maths Olympiad and Maths Games program is a competitive and engaging initiative designed to challenge students' problem-solving and critical thinking skills, through fun, strategic puzzles and activities that build their Mathematical skills. Along the way, students participate in individual competitions four times throughout the year. Congratulations to the following students on their top 3 placings in the first competition and we look forward to the second competition in Week 9 of this term.

When reading a new word like 'dog, your child needs to know the sounds that letters 'd', 'o', and 'g' represent. They would sound out each part — /d/ - /o/ - /g/ and then blend the sounds together to read the word 'dog'. This process is called decoding, and it's a crucial skill for learning to read confidently.

How can you help at home?

The following ideas and games can help your child with their knowledge of sounds and other reading skills:

<u>"I Spy":</u>

- Instead of using letter names, use the letter sounds.
- "I spy something beginning with the /s/ ('ssss') sound."

Sound Stretching:

- Say a word slowly and encourage your child to stretch the sounds. Then, have them blend it back together to say the word.
- "Let's say 'cat' slowly: /c/... /a/ ... /t/. Now, can you say it fast?"

Mystery Word:

- Say a word with the sounds separated, and your child guesses the word by blending the sounds together.
- "I'll say the sounds slowly: /s/ ... /u/ ... /n/. What word is that?" (Answer: sun).

These types of activities and games can support your child to listen to sounds, blend them together, and connect them to form words — all important early reading skills!






